Consider the 4 C's for every AP ART assignment:

Craftsmanship/Technique: The development of artistic skill/control over art materials through deliberation and attention to detail.

Composition: Intentionally organizing art elements using the art principles to create a visually unified design.

Communication: Applying art knowledge and skill to express, identify, and evaluate ideas and feelings in artwork.

Creative Process: An approach to solving problems and expressing ideas in unique and personal ways.

WHAT IS THE AP ART COURSE ABOUT?

The AP Studio Art courses are designed for students who are seriously interested in the practical experience of art. AP Courses and portfolios emphasize challenging, research-based curricula aligned with higher education expectations.

As in any college-level course, it is expected that

you will spend a considerable amount of time outside the classroom working on completion of assignments. Ideas for projects or solutions to problems should be worked out in a sketchbook both in class and outside of class. This is the most rigorous art course, so expect to work independently, work hard in and out of class, and grow as an artist.

INSTRUCTIONAL GOALS OF THE COURSE

- (1) Conduct a sustained investigation through practice, experimentation, & revision
- (2) Skillfully synthesize materials, processes, and ideas, and
- (3) Articulate, in writing, information about one's work.

In this course, we will continually address your ability to recognize the quality of your work, your sustained investigation of a particular visual interest or problem and your visual demonstration of your range of approaches to art making (composition and technique)


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AP ART SUMMER PACKET

SUSTAINED INVESTIGATION: HOW IS THE EXAM SCORED?

The Sustained Investigation is 60% of the portfolio exam score

Submit 15 images that demonstrate:

- Sustained investigation through practice, experimentation, & revision
- · Sustained investigation of materials, processes, & ideas
- · Synthesis of materials, processes, & ideas
- 2D/3D/Drawing skills

State the following in writing:

- Identify the questions that guided your sustained investigation
- Describe how your sustained investigation shows evidence of practice, experimentation, and revision guided by your questions Identify the Materials used Processes used Size for each image

SELECTED WORKS: HOW IS THE EXAM SCORED?

The Sustained Investigation is 40% of the portfolio exam score

Submit five works that demonstrate:

· Synthesis of materials, processes, and ideas

For each work, state the following in writing:

- Idea(s) visually evident (100 characters)
- · Materials used, Processes used

The Selected Works are prepared and physically sent to the College Board reviewers. Five images are selected to be scored.

The Selected Works can be no larger that 18"x24"

Find inspiration from historical work by researching an art movement and finding commonalities in works of art from a specific art movement.

REQUIREMENTS

- Engaging composition.

Before starting your art piece...

- 1. Create a folder with at least 5 researched images that inspire you from an art movement
- 2. Write a list of at least 5 things you notice are visually prominent in the works you researched
- 3. Write a sentence in your process journal about the context for the historical art
- 4. Sketch some ideas.
- 5. Draw 3 compositional thumbnail sketches
- 6. Select the most dynamic composition to develop

Teacher Tip: Research art you love.

Find a subject matter that is not common in the researched art so that you have an unique visual response

- 1. Explain your artistic decisions:
 - What is the idea that is driving this art piece? What materials, why? What processes, why?
- 2. What visual decision-making is evident in your final work?
- 3. Share how your creative decisions reveal your feelings about the topic.
- 4. Ask a question to further this inquiry. This can be a because/but/ so question. How can you extend this exploration in future work?

#2: Emotional: PORTRAIT OR FIGURATIVE IMAGE

Create a portrait or figurative image with strong emotion.

What amplifies emotion? Consider exaggerated value, color, forms, light/shadow, atmospheric perspective, focus/blurriness.


